If yes, give a brief descripiton and a list of modules currently operational (maximum 500 words)	The college has MIS. All the records of administrative work including accounts, fee, admission is fully computerized and maintained at different levels in the office and information is received, recorded and retrieved whenever required. Available financial resources are effectively managed by the fully computerized accounts department of the institution. The college follows double entry system for maintaining the accounts, which are of the following three types: • Income and Expenditure • Receipts and Payment Accounts • Balance Sheets. The institution is using computerized finance management software (Tally). The audit is a regular process without fail, ever

since 2008. To maintain financial prudence and ensure good accounting practices in college and to provide proper platform for audit compliance for better governance for maintaining an effective check on accounts, two types of system are adopted viz. Internal Audit and External Audit former is conducted by the college Accounts Committee whereas the latter is done by Chartered Accountant at the end of the every academic session. The college has constituted a Purchase Committee and a Maintenance Committee to monitor the use of financial resources in an efficient and effective manner.

#### 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

In order to ensure effective implementation of the curriculum, the college takes up many initiatives for effective delivery of curriculum through a well planned and documented process in the following ways: - • Adhering to the Academic Calendar issued by the University, a year planner is chalked out in consultation with all the faculty members. • The students are made aware of the academic plans initially through the Prospectus as well as the proper orientation programme in the classrooms by their respective teachers. • Syllabus, books and suggested readings are discussed in the classrooms by the respective teachers. • The assessment of the students is awarded on the basis of their performance in class tests, house tests and practicals, behavior modifications, assignments and discussions. • Mid semester exams are conducted to prepare the students for final university examinations. • In the Semester System, the course content is bifurcated according to the University Semester Examinations; it is split into two terms i.e. July-Dec, Jan-May. • The Teachers plan their work in view of the abilities of the slow learners, the average students and the advanced learners. • The attendance and the score in the terminal examinations are considered for eligibility for the final University Examinations. • Incentives and scholarships are given for encouraging the deserving and meritorious students. • The IQAC monitors the regular feedback regarding curriculum delivery from the stakeholders which helps in incorporating remedial measures. • Regular staff meetings are held to discuss the teaching schedule, books and activities to be organized. • Faculty members maintain a healthy informal interaction with the members of the Board of Studies of other colleges and the University teachers to discuss the changes in curriculum as well as to improve their teaching practices. • The faculty is also encouraged to attend the Seminars, Faculty Development Programs and to publish research articles in Journals of national and international reputation to promote research culture among the faculty and the students. • Educational tours and trips are organized by the college from time to time to supplement classroom experience with hands-on-knowledge. • Collaboration with institutions and organizations of reputation is established in order to provide the best of facilities and resources available to the students. • Various extension

A mentors work is very wide ranging particularly in college where a teacher is not only a teacher but a friend, guide and to an extent have parental role. Students in higher education are involved in wide varieties of activities and most of the students take active part in extracurricular activities. These activities are looked after by teacher or group of teachers. Student rely on mentors to provide encouragement and guidance. These teachers act as their mentors and provide necessary support to students. They not only provides proper guidance but also take personal care of students for career development, academic, social and health related issues by personal counselling as well as group discussion. It helps the mentor to gaining insight into the strengths and weakness of students. It aims in developing a close relationship with the students providing the emotional support, advice and guidance. Mentoring includes curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular, sports and health and personality developmental aspects of the students. Research Scholars work under a guide or supervisor here we have closest interactions between the scholars and their guides in mutually supportive manners. Both fulfill their commitments effectively. The mentoring system is very effective for entire under graduate first semester and a significant part of the post graduate students who are taking admission first time as they are new to college culture. Students from small villages needed special attention as they come from remote region where development is yet to take place they do face language problems and adjustment problems in new social milieu, they are not only supported by the mentors but also by students representatives. 2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

• Being affiliated to Panjab University Chandigarh, the college follows continuous internal evaluation as prescribed by the university. Students subject knowledge assessed through direct and indirect methods of assessment. Micro lessons and Macro lessons are also as a part of Internal Evaluation. Preliminary exam held just before the university exam to give practice to students for exam. The examination committee of the college takes care of preparing the time table and conducting the exams. The committee also ensures transparency in evaluation as well as the continuous assessment of the students. Assignments, seminars, general behavior and attendance are taken into consideration while awarding internal marks to the students. Grievances if any in assessment are collected orally and resolved by the grievance redressal cell and examination committee. Retests are conducted for those students who remain absent during the internal examinations owing to their participation in cocurricular activities and other valid reasons so as to facilitate continuation of their studies without hindrance. In the case of practicals, the teacher educators continuously assess the students' performance right from the beginning till the end of the academic year by using structured evaluation proforma. The schedules of the internal examinations are made known to the students through the academic calendar. The performance of the students in the internals is monitored by the Principal and the necessary feedback is given to the concerned faculty members. The marks in the internal examination are communicated to the parents/ guardians and they are advised to note the performance of their wards and take remedial measures if needed.

The academic calendar gives a clear picture of the available dates for significant activities to ensure proper curriculum transaction and continuous evaluation. The college prepares academic calendar at the beginning of the year in consultation with all faculty members. • The academic calendar is discussed in the staff meeting for implementation. • All activities conducted throughout the year are also planned in the academic calendar. • The academic calendar contains the yearly schedule of important Days celebrations, Festival celebrations, Term Paper, Cultural Programs, Sports Day, One Day Picnic, Vacations and Holidays. These are children who are exceptional in that their learning and behavior deviates significantly from the normal. Children with Intellectual Disabilities need special care to progress

in their academics. Unfortunately most of them are not getting it so for helping these students Remedial programme for children with special needs with intellectual disability was organized during teaching practice. Special efforts are made by IQAC of the college such as Remedial programme on 13.08.17 to 27.08.17 in which 10 students participants and one teacher incharge MS. Kavita participated with zeal and warmth. Use of Remedial teaching: multisensory techniques, Peer tutoring and educational games were incorporated for children with special needs with intellectual disability. 2. VALUE ADDED COURSES The courses was introduced to bridge the gap between academic and moral values .It is important to supplement the curriculum to make students better prepare to develop their personal skills.
